Karl G. Maeser Preparatory Academy is truly a family and it takes all of us working together to ensure our students' success in middle school, high school, college, and life. We hope this guide will assist parents in understanding who Karl G. Maeser was, and the unique experience Maeser provides as a school.

Karl G. Maeser Preparatory Academy is a classical, liberal arts focused school serving grades 7-12. Our student body is made up of 640 students from various backgrounds. Our curriculum is academically rigorous. Our expectations are high and the workload is challenging. Attendance is integral in success in the classroom and beyond. Our standards are high for participation in extracurriculars, as are our expectations for student behavior. Your support in helping your student(s) keep the standards of truth, honor, and virtue, in addition to wearing the uniform properly, completing homework and assignments on time, attending consistently, and "being their best self" is imperative to their success at Maeser.

Maeser Mission Statement

Karl G. Maeser Preparatory Academy empowers and inspires students to learn continually, think critically and communicate effectively through Socratic methods in order to better themselves and their community.

Maeser Educational Philosophy

The purpose of education is to help individuals recognize and cherish the values, knowledge, habits, and character traits that will help them lead a successful, productive, and service-oriented life. "The real essence of education is that it enables men to reach the true aim of their lives" (Werner Jaeger, *Paideia* 2.69). True education transforms and develops the whole person. Maeser strongly believes that an intensive and broad study of our classical Western heritage is foundational and indispensable in helping students understand their local and global societies, as well as how to improve them .

Maeser's mission is to use classical education to *empower* and inspire students to think critically, learn continually, and communicate effectively through Socratic methods to better themselves and their community. This mission is the foundation upon which everything else is built. Maeser helps students develop these foundational characteristics by studying the greatest expressions and discoveries of humanity, whether in art, literature, science, or mathematics, which gives students the opportunity to pattern their lives and values after principles of truth, honor, and virtue.

A classical education combined with dynamic and powerful teaching encourages and inspires students to seek knowledge and learning for their own sake. The great challenge of education is to kindle within each student a desire to learn. Plutarch said, "The mind is not a vessel to be filled, but a fire to be kindled" (*On Listening to Lectures*).

Maeser's motto --Truth, Honor, Virtue -- provides the necessary framework for students to continue to grow and mature.

Truth: Maeser students seek after truth and defend it, even when it is difficult.

Honor: Maeser students are honest and act with integrity in all things.

Virtue: Maeser students exemplify virtue by having the courage to do what is right and to avoid what is wrong.

As a college preparatory academy, Maeser encourages and prepares students for higher education. Rather than focusing narrowly and specifically on "college prep", Maeser focuses on building students intellectually and socially who will naturally be ready for the difficulties of higher education. Thus, college preparation is an important byproduct of Maeser's approach to classical education. As a result of what they experience and learn at Maeser, students will be prepared to successfully continue their education and further their learning in college.

Academic Expectations

Academics are a priority at Maeser. Grades and attendance matter. Developing strong academic habits and prioritizing skills now will make the transition to college much easier. Students are expected to come to class having completed any necessary homework and prepared to engage in class discussions and lessons. With the shortened amount of in-class instructional time, student preparation will be more important than ever to maximize learning.

Letter grades are not an indication of a student's intrinsic worth or value. Grades, however, are a valuable indicator of a student's understanding and mastery of the academic content of the class. Teachers do not *give* grades; students *earn* them. Concerns about a particular class should be directed first to the teacher. If concerns persist, please contact administration.

Every student is expected to be a full-time student, meaning each student is required to take 6 academic courses at Maeser each semester/year. Maeser requires 27 credits to graduate, including Winterim credit. With an 8 period day, there is plenty of time and opportunity to pursue electives in addition to the required coursework. 6 academic courses can not include TA, peer-supported study skills, and/or seminary.

Students at Maeser wear uniforms as outlined in our Student Handbook. Just as a judge wears certain ceremonial clothing when presiding over court cases, a school uniform is the ceremonial clothing that indicates serious intellectual effort is being put forth. More information about our uniform policy and a list of approved uniform vendors can also be found on our website.

Students who are not wearing the proper uniform will receive a uniform violation. They will then have the option to call home to have someone bring their uniform to purchase used uniform items from the front desk. Students will not be permitted to return to class if they are out of uniform. Multiple uniform violations (5) result in suspension from school.

Bell Schedule

School starts at 8:00 am. Students are expected to arrive early and to be in their seats ready to start the day. The school day ends at 3:30 pm, *Monday through Thursday*. Fridays will be used for small group tutoring, testing, additional mentoring and teacher preparation. This year, because of pandemic considerations, students will not be allowed to remain on campus after school ends, unless they are meeting with a specific teacher or participating in an extracurricular activity.

Assignments & Grades

To facilitate the best communication and community relations in the event you have a concern about your student and his/her grades or a classroom concern, administration highly suggests the parents reach out and contact the teacher directly *before* approaching the counselors or Administration.

Counseling

Counselors do more than schedule changes, but they are not licensed therapists. They can not recommend therapy either. If your student needs mental health counseling, please see your personal physician for recommendations.

Each semester students may wish to change their schedules. Students may have one class change per semester for free. After that, they are charged \$10 for each class change. Use Class Change Request Form link to download the form at home or from www.maeserprep.org website under the Counselor tab.

Math Classes & Placement

If you would like your 7th, 8th, 9th or 10th grade student to be considered for a different math class than their grade level, you may request to have them take a math placement test. Please contact the math department at maeser.math@maeserprep.org to make arrangements. The math placement test score is not used for enrollment decisions; it simply helps us know which math class your student should take.

Grade-level math classes are: Math 7 (7th graders), Math 8 (8th graders), Secondary I (9th graders), or Secondary II (10th graders).

All incoming 11th & 12th graders will be invited to meet with a high school counselor to discuss graduation requirements and math class placement. Be prepared to bring your most current transcript.

Carpool Info

Maeser has a dedicated carpool lane that requires all carpool drivers to pull around to the north end of the building all the way through to almost the math building. When carpool drivers stop in the front of the building instead of pulling all the way around, the carpool line gets backed up and it creates a dangerous traffic situation around 1600 North **PLEASE do NOT** use the church parking lot or 1600 North as your drop-off or pick-up point. You may enter the parking lot from either the 1600 N or 400 West entrance.

Lunch Options

Maeser does not provide lunch for students. During this Pandemic, the cafeteria is closed for eating. Students are highly encouraged to socially distance outside eating their own home-provided lunch. Microwaves will be available in specified classrooms, but only 12 students are allowed in each of these classrooms and must socially distance.

Students in grades 7-8 are not allowed off-campus during lunch. High school students have an open campus for lunch and are allowed to leave campus. Lunch is 30 minutes long (11:28-12:02 pm) and students will not be excused for tardiness due to lengthy lunch lines at local fast-food restaurants.

Winterim

Winterim is an integral part of a Maeser education and a Maeser graduation requirement. Winterim is held during the first three weeks of school after Christmas Break, from 9am-2pm. Students may choose an on-campus option from the Winterim Catalog or submit an application for an Independent Study Winterim (which must be approved by the Winterim Committee). Course offerings will be presented to students during the first term. Students with excessive absences, NGs, habitual uniform violations, and/or failing grades will be evaluated after the first term and may be placed in Credit Recovery. Winterfest is held on the last day of Winterim for students and teachers to showcase their Winterim work. Registration and due dates for Winterim, including Independent Study proposals, will be posted on the school website and shared via normal communication channels.

Because of the shortened and intensified nature of Winterim, attendance is vital. Missing one day of Winterim is equivalent to missing one entire week of regular school.

Middle School Students during Winterim

During Winterim, all middle school students participate in Middle School Intensives (MSI). During MSI, middle school students rotate through various classes, including High School Prep, World Cultures, Agriculture, Sewing, and various activities and field trips. MSI is an opportunity for middle school students to learn things they wouldn't normally have time for in their regular academic schedule. The schedule for MSI is the same as Winterim, and participation in MSI is an important part of the Maeser academic experience.

Grade Level Information

7th Grade

Maeser added $7^{th}/8^{th}$ grades so that students could be better prepared for high school, where graduation requirements are rigorous and specific to the Maeser classical education model.

Maeser's plan is to support every 7th grade student in learning vital organization skills necessary to succeed in a school setting, to be responsible for their learning, and to be accountable for the rigor and expectations of being a Maeser student. Parents can expect and help students to complete homework and assignments on time.

Every 7th grade student will take SOAR (Safe, Organized, Accountable, and Respectful). This class teaches vital skills such as organization, including a school and home filing system, and other academic behaviors necessary for success in school and in life. If your student struggles with organization, make sure to talk to the instructor to help understand how the home filing system works.

Latin at Maeser Prep

The requirement that all 7th and 8th grade students take Latin may seem odd or outdated. In today's world of constantly increasing bandwidth and expanding connectivity, the study of Latin can initially seem awkwardly out of place. However, in a constantly changing world, studying Latin provides important tools and necessary context to help students make sense of their world.

As students embark on their study of Latin, they begin to learn the intricacies of a powerful language that came to dominate the western world for nearly two millennia. Latin's complex syntax and grammar demands close attention and scrutiny, which reinforce critical thinking skills. Latin's influence on English vocabulary is well-established, and students who apply themselves find their ability to express themselves improves. The influence of Greek and Roman literature cannot be underestimated, and the ancient echoes into our modern period. Students deserve to be introduced these greatest ideas, themes, and characters. As students become increasingly familiar with the great heroes, love stories, and events of the past, their present becomes more and more understandable and meaningful. Studying Latin allows students to enter into a great and powerful conversation that has shaped and molded history. Studying Latin gives students the opportunity to become sculptors of their own future by better understanding the rocks they themselves are hewn from.

8th Grade

8th grade students take steps to become leaders and not followers. Commitment to Maeser and to "being their best selves" is explored in all classes but is the focus of the Maeser-specific leadership and communication classes. We use animal icons as quick reminders to help develop our virtue. We will offer the parent version of this class in the near future.



8th grade is the final preparation year before high school, where academic behaviors must be engaged at the highest levels. Parents can help students commit to being on time to all classes, support their learning by helping them utilize all resources available, and communicating effectively with teachers and counselors. Maeser is a good school, but it is not a one-size-fits- all and finding the right fit for your student's educational experience is vital.

8th grade students are still expected to use their SOAR skills and keep up with a planner that is provided for them each year in addition to the organizational system that supports their class engagement and accountability. They will begin to develop additional life skills in digital citizenship. We encourage Maeser parents to discuss appropriate and acceptable digital behavior with their students.

Practices for most of the middle school sports are held before school begins.

Students must earn a 2.7 GPA with no Fs from the previous term in order to participate in sports/activities. For example, boys basketball takes place during the 2nd term of the year so in order to be eligible student-athletes must have earned a 2.7 during the 1st term. Coaches have the discretion to monitor grades during the term the sport is being played and if students fall below a 2.7 or have Fs/NGs can temporarily suspend their participation until the grades improve.

9th Grade

Attendance

All-Day Absence

Parents can excuse all day absences within 10 school days of the date of the absence calling the main office at (801) 235-9000 or emailing attendance@maeserprep.org.

How to Excuse Tardies/Absences

Please note that for safety and liability reasons, we cannot excuse a student's absence without an email ahead of time.

Maeser's Attendance Secretary is the appropriate point of contact for all attendance-related questions. You can email the Attendance Secretary at attendance@maeserprep.org. or call at 801-235-9000.

A parent/guardian may excuse any first period tardy or absence within 10 school days. This may be done by phone, email, or note for this year. In rare cases, you can excuse in person in the front office. Our pandemic protocols are trying to minimize office visits by visitors.

When excusing your student with a note or email, please include the following:

- Student name
- Date of the absence
- Time and date the note was written
- Reason for absence
- Specific class periods missed.
- Signature (if a note)
- Phone number where parent/guardian can be reached during the day
- Healthcare provider's signature (if applicable)

Fraudulent excusing of tardies/absences by students will result in school discipline.

Maeser Prep's mission focuses on empowering and inspiring students, and we believe that sports and activities can help in this mission.

For sports, all students must complete a physical before competing. Maeser uses the UHSAA physical form for all sports including middle school sports.

Maeser offers the following extracurricular activities for high school students:

Fall: co-ed Ultimate Frisbee, girls soccer, cross-country, boys volleyball, girls tennis, girls volleyball, baseball, Shakespeare Competition

Winter: boys basketball, girls basketball, swimming

Spring: co-ed Ultimate Frisbee, boys soccer, boys tennis, track and field, Drama

In order to participate in any extracurricular activity, all students (7th-12th grade) must earn a 2.7 GPA with no Fs from the previous term. For example, if a sport/activity takes place during the 2nd term students must earn a 2.7 during the 1st term. For extracurricular activities that take place during the 1st term, 4th term grades from the previous school year are used. High school students must be on track for graduation and if they have failed a course from any high school term it must be made up before participation. For example, a junior wants to play soccer but failed their Socratic 9 class. This class must be made up before they can play.

Fees

Maeser publishes an annual Fee Schedule & Spend Plan on our website (under "Parents" tab). These documents outline all the fees a student may be charged, the deadlines for paying fees, and information about applying for a fee waiver. Both documents can be found on our website or you can pick up a copy in the front office. Fees can be paid online, by calling the front office with a credit card number, or by paying with cash or a check. Any questions about fees should be directed to the Finance Office at finance@maeserprep.org.

Item Drop-off

In order to mitigate foot traffic, crowding, and protect our front office staff, parents will no longer be allowed to drop items off in the front office for their student (e.g., lunches, school projects, sports equipment, etc.). There will be a table placed at the front of the school where parents can leave things for their students at their own risk. Teachers and front office staff will not monitor the table. Parents will be responsible for communicating with their student if there is something they are leaving. Students may retrieve items during passing periods and at lunch, but may not leave the classroom during scheduled class time.

Uniforms

Maeser believes that education is a serious and sacred endeavor. Thus, in many ways schools can be special buildings. They are a place where students can converse with the sages of the past, grapple with the issues of today, and wonder at the mysteries of tomorrow.

Just as someone might dress differently or in a specific way for a job or activity, students dress in school uniforms to prepare their minds and bodies for the transformational act of learning. Wearing clothes that are different from a student's normal, everyday attire indicates that there is something special about what they are doing. A school uniform contributes to the atmosphere of all students' important and serious academic endeavor

School uniforms, including cardigans and blazers, should be washed regularly.
